


Spring begins this year on March 20th, and for scuba divers that means that the local diving season is just around the corner. If you want to make the most of the 2023 scuba diving season, I advocate taking several steps right now.

First and foremost is to make sure that you are healthy enough to scuba dive! If you have not seen your doctor in over a year, or if you have experienced a change in your health since your last visit to your doctor, I strongly recommend consulting with your physician before you make any scuba dives.

Scuba diving is a gear intensive activity, so it makes sense to make sure that your dive gear, like your health are in good condition to dive. If your gear has been sitting quietly in storage over the winter, it is a wise precaution to inspect your scuba kit before you leave for your next scuba dive/trip.

Many people believe that a buoyancy control device (BCD) is the heart of your scuba kit, so it makes sense to begin with your BCD. I recommend that you check to see that your BCD will hold air (or whatever berating gas you plan to use). Start by inspect the BCDs inflators (both the oral and the low-pressure inflator) to ensure that it your BCD inflators are not sticking or leaking. In addition, I would check your BCD dump valves to make sure that the BCD can dump whatever breathing gas you plan on inflating it with.



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


If your BCD valves or dumps are sticking, it may be possible to correct the problem by flushing the valve or dump with copious amounts of fresh water. If that does not work, bring your BCD to your local dive center to have them fix or replace the valve or dump on your BCD. As your BCD is essential to maintaining your position in the water column, a leaking or sticking valve or dump could pose serious problems that are easily fixed prior to your dive.

I would also take the time to check the bands or straps securing your scuba cylinder to your BCD, as well as the releases that secure the BCD to your body while you are diving. If your BCD is equipped with a weight pocket system, I also recommend inspecting the weight pocket release mechanism to ensure that it is functioning properly. I would finish by inflating your BCD and letting it sit inflated for at least a couple of hours to ensure that your BCD does not leak. If your BCD cannot hold air for a few hours, it most likely will not be capable of holding air for the length of your dive.

Another important piece of dive gear that you should inspect before you go diving is your dive computer. Today's scuba computers are modern marvels that do an excellent job of measuring important information relevant to your dive. However, every scuba computer relies on battery power to function. While there are a few dive computers that use solar power, even solar powered computers have batteries, and those batteries should be checked before you leave for your dive. Some dive computers have user replaceable batteries, other dive computers require that the computer be returned to the manufacturer for the battery to be replaced. If you are not sure how to check or replace the batteries on your dive computer, I recommend checking with the experts at your local dive center.

When it comes to your scuba regulator, I believe that it is best to have it inspected annually by a qualified regulator service technician. There



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


are multiple parts in your scuba regulator(s), and a number of those parts need to be replaced at regular intervals. Depending on the make and model of your regulator, it may require a servicing every year or every other year. While a regulator service or inspection does not take very long for a skilled technician, I recommend bringing your regulator in for service early, lest you wait till the last minute and the service technician at your local dive center has several regulators to inspect/service before he/she can take care of yours.

When it comes to your scuba fins, it is always a good idea to inspect the straps or springs securing the fin to your feet as well as the foot pocket of the fin to make sure that there are no tears or breaks in the material. You do not want to be in the middle of a dive and lose your ability to propel yourself!

Your scuba masks are another item that does not require much time but is still important to check. Look to make sure that the mask strap is not beginning to tear or rip and that the mask glass has no cracks or leaks. I recommend filling your mask with fresh water then placing a denture cleaning agent (like Polident tablets) in the mask and letting the mixture sit overnight. This will clean your mask and, provided the solution remains in the mask at the level you left it the night before, ensures that your mask does not leak.

When it comes to your exposure protection, your inspection will vary significantly if you use a wetsuit or a dry suit. If you only use a wetsuit, you just need to check to make sure the zipper(s) will open and close and ensure that your wetsuit still fits (some wetsuit materials will shrink over time). If you use a dry suit, in addition to checking to see if the zipper still opens and closes freely, you should inspect the wrist and neck seals to make sure that there are no tears or signs of excessive wear. In addition, you need to check the inflation and dump valve as


well as preform a pressure test of your entire suit to ensure that your dry suit is airtight.

A pressure test involves closing the dry suit zipper as well as securing the wrist and neck seals, then filling the dry suit up with air. If your dry suit fails to hold the air you filled it with, you check to see how the air is escaping from your dry suit (usually by spraying a solution of soapy water on the exterior of the suit to see where bubbles form). If this process sounds too complex for you, or if you do not possess the means to properly secure your dry suit seals, you can always bring your dry suit to your local dive center and ask them to pressure test it for you.

If your dry suit does have a minor leak, it may be possible for you to seal it with products that are readily available at your local dive center. However, if your dry suit zipper is leaking, or if the leak is significant, you have a more serious repair that needs to be addressed by a skilled technician or by returning your dry suit to the dry suit manufacturer.

Another item of your scuba kit that you should inspect before you start diving is your surface marker buoy (SMB). This is accomplished by inflating your SMB to see that the inflator and dump valve are operating normally. Like your BCD, you should inflate your SMB and let it reman inflated for at least a few hours to ensure that there are no leaks.

If you own your own scuba cylinder(s), they need to be visually inspected by a qualified visual inspection technician every year and hydrostatically tested every five years. Your cylinders last visual inspection date will be listed on a sticker affixed to the side of the cylinder. The cylinders last hydrostatic test date will be stamped into the material at the top of the cylinder.



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


If there is still an adequate amount of breathing gas within your cylinder, you may use that breathing gas for a dive. However, dive centers will routinely refuse to fill any cylinder that is beyond its visual inspection or hydrostatic test date. A visual inspection usually does not take very long (assuming that your cylinder is in good condition). However, a hydrostatic test may take a couple of weeks to complete as most dive centers send cylinders out for that service. In addition, if you use enriched air nitrox in your cylinder(s) the cylinder(s) will need to be oxygen cleaned after the hydrostatic test before you can use the cylinder(s) with enriched air nitrox again.

If you regularly use a dive light/strobe light (and I sincerely hope that you do), you should check your dive light/strobe batteries prior to your dive. If your dive light/strobe has user replicable batteries, you should consider exchanging the old batteries for new batteries before you start to dive. If your dive light/strobe uses rechargeable batteries, it is prudent to fully charge those batteries before your first dive. I would also recommend testing your dive light/strobe by turning it on under water to ensure that your dive light/strobe is still watertight.

Aside from checking all the above scuba equipment, I would also recommend making an honest assessment of your current scuba diving skills. Most major scuba training agencies recommend that you take a refresher course if you have not been diving in over six months. Your local dive center or scuba instructor can provide an update that covers knowledge and essential scuba skills in a safe confined water setting, and it only takes a few hours! You might also consider improving upon your scuba skills by taking a class in an advanced scuba course or by taking one of the special-ty courses that your local dive center or instructor offers.

Please remember that while scuba diving has an excellent safety record, you are still entering into an environment where people need

specialized equipment and training. Therefore, it is prudent to ensure that your health, equipment and skills are ready. Please be safe and I hope that you have a great dive season!
